



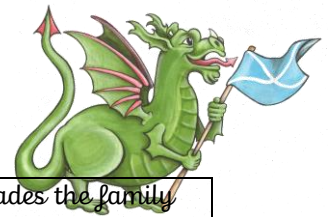




	Book Title	Synopsis
